

**BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS  
CITY OF DOTHAN, ALABAMA  
REGULAR MEETING  
AUGUST 21, 2007**

The Board of Commissioners of the City of Dothan, Alabama, met in regular session in the Commission Chambers of the Roy Driggers Municipal Building at 10:00 A.M., Tuesday, August 21, 2007 with the following members present: Mayor Pat Thomas, Associate Commissioners Larry Matthews, Amos M. Newsome, Jr., Paul Lee, Jason Rudd and Phillip Tidwell. Commissioner Taylor Barbaree was absent. Also present were City Manager Michael West, City Clerk Pam McCoy, Secretary Tammy Danner, who recorded the Minutes of the Meeting, and the local news media representatives.

Mayor Thomas called the meeting to order. Commissioner Tidwell, then led in prayer, after which he led in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Commissioner Tidwell moved that the Minutes of the Meeting of August 14, 2007, be approved, motion seconded by Commissioner Lee and unanimously approved.

Commissioner Matthews commended Chief Powell for the commercial he did on school safety recently. He said it would be good if we could get more of that.

Mayor Thomas said we have talked about recycling for several months now. He said he would like to see, within thirty days, options and projected costs and let this group make a decision on which way we are going to go. City Manager West said he would put something together for the Commission.

In regard to the Southwest Park property, Mayor Thomas said even though the specific property was not addressed at the last meeting, the thought of a southwest park is still very much in the works. Mayor Thomas said there will be a called meeting of the Recreation Board this Thursday to talk about different land parcels.

Commissioner Tidwell said he attended a meeting the other day and there were questions and comments about the permitting office being open at a certain time and the doors would be locked at a certain time. Commissioner Tidwell requested that a memorandum be sent to every home builder or anyone in the trades that need to get inspections of anything new that may be coming up, etc. He said there are a lot of times they need to call in and anything we can do to help them not lose a day of work because the inspection has not been done would be greatly appreciated.

Commissioner Tidwell said he heard a rumor concerning impact fees that may be coming forward here soon. He said in his personal opinion that may be something in the future, but right now, after the one cent sales tax that was passed it is not the right timing. City Manager West said the only conversation he remembered was about providing upgrades to the lift stations to accommodate future growth on Fortner Street. He said the developers themselves brought up the possibility of assessing an impact fee to have the lift stations enlarged once and for all rather than each person coming along individually and having to pay for the upgrade.

Todd McDonald, Director of Planning and Zoning said a true impact fee is non-authorized in the State of Alabama with the exception of Baldwin County. Mayor Thomas said the true impact fees that we have had discussion about are surrounding communities that we charge impact fees to. He said as our sewage costs continue to rise, those impact fees will be addressed. Mayor Thomas said he has had no discussion with anyone else other than what the developers brought up themselves.

Commissioner Lee requested an update on the scheduling for the flushing of pipes. Billy Mayes, Dothan Utilities Superintendent explained that when we put a new line in for service we have to flush the lines. He said we require the contractor to do it during the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 4:00 a.m. in the morning. This is to

lessen any disturbance on our customers. He said if they have any discolored water when they get up or before they go to bed at night they need to flush the system a little bit. If they continue to have problems they can give us a call. Mr. Mayes said that would be the whole new line from Westgate all the way to Highway 231, Redmond Road, Flynn Road, Denton Road, Hicks Road and Harrison Road. He said it is going to be done in segments and over several nights. Mr. Mayes said for anyone needing to call in they could call 615-3000 or 615-3302. That will forward you to the dispatch center. Cynthia Green said that was in the press release sent out yesterday.

Commissioner Lee said he wanted to make sure everyone knew about it and that the hours and locations were made known to the public.

Commissioner Newsome asked if we had asked the residents to not use water from the 10:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m. or be careful on how they do it. Mr. Mayes said they just need to be aware of what is going on so if they do have discoloration that it is not some other issue it is the flushing of that line. He said it will occur when you use large volumes of water. Commissioner Newsome said with discoloration there are impurities in the water. Mr. Mayes said you are talking about iron and manganese in the water. He said he has never seen any issues with it. Mr. Mayes said it is nothing to be scared about, but it is an issue we have. City Manager West said there could potentially be some pressure problems during the process.

Commissioner Lee said what it comes down to is that we are trying to make it better. He said this is just a process that we have to go through to get it to that point.

Mayor Thomas requested an update from City Attorney Len White regarding the Eva Matthews case. Mr. White said the lawsuit was filed about three years ago, around June, 2004. The court ruled in our favor in November, 2006. The case was appealed to the 11<sup>th</sup> Circuit Court of Appeals around January of this year where it is has been pending. Mr. White said that means that the parties submitted briefs; the court will determine whether or not the ruling in the City's favor will stand. That opinion has not been issued at this point. Mr. White said it could come at any time. Mayor Thomas said at one time we were talking about trying to recover legal fees in arrears. He said that is on hold until the decision is reaffirmed. Mr. White said the case involved more than just the City. There was also the Chairman of the Citizen's Supervisory Committee who was sued. The City defended him as a defendant. The City did seek restitution for those attorney's fees. Mr. White said that suit was also dismissed, but it was not appealed. He said the ruling on the case against the City will not have any bearing on whether or not costs are recovered; however, the Court will wait until the case is decided in total.

Kim Meeker, Leisure Services updated the Commission on the Miracle Field Project.

City Manager West reminded everyone that the Burn Ban was still in affect.

City Manager West stated that HUD had accepted the Annual Action Plan.

City Manager West announced that the City United Way Campaign kicked off this week. The City is a pace setter, which means we will try to complete the campaign by the end of August.

Cynthia Green, Public Information Officer stated that she had sent out a notice to all of the media last Wednesday asking them for better ways for us to get immediate messaging out to our customers. She said about 95% of them provided her with some updated information as far as weekend reporters and other information that would be helpful. Mrs. Green said they let us know that text messaging was probably most valuable to them over the weekends. Direct calls to them are important. Mrs. Green said much of this we are already doing. They have just given us some new names to add to the list. Mrs. Green said we are also looking into text alert subscribing for the City of Dothan. She said it is very effective with some of the mediums that we have. Mrs. Green said in the case a couple of weeks ago when we had some 1,000 customers that were effected, messages were directed to the media. She encouraged the residents to call the

various radio stations; they have the information and when they are looking for their news to call resourceful information where they can get accurate information, which is here at the City or even some of the radio stations, some TV and some newspapers. Mrs. Green said we are very fortunate that our media does present accurate information, but sometimes word of mouth is not always the best. She said, as far as what we are trying to do at Dothan Utilities to help free up some of the telephone lines, Tim Stewart, IT Manager for the City of Dothan and Billy Mayes, Dothan Utilities Superintendent are working with the City Manager and their staff to alleviate some of the missed calls. We are changing the message that the callers will receive whenever they call. Mrs. Green said there are a lot of telephone calls coming in at one time. Every call is valuable to us. She said it takes time to get staff in place to accept the weekend calls, but we are working toward bettering that.

City Manager West said we are also looking at a utility system that helps with identifying outages and has the ability to relay messages to customers. He said it is a very expensive system, over \$200,000.00. Mr. West said we are also looking at a reverse 911 system where we could identify areas and the people in those areas would receive phone calls. He said all of these systems will cost additional money and at some point we have to weigh the costs against being utilized once every couple of years or so. Mr. West said the utility system would also help us better identify where outages are and what lines are down, etc. He said when we look at some of our other needs for equipment and transformer replacements we have sort of moved in a direction where we have other priorities. Mr. West said at some point in time a system like this or the reverse 911 system would allow us the ability to identify areas and start calling people on a systematic basis to warn them of such things as a chlorine leak and we need to evacuate the area.

Mayor Thomas said there is a private company in Marianna that does that; we would not have to reinvent the wheel. He said they do it for less than a penny a call. Mayor Thomas asked about a phone bank, something that would receive up to a 100 phone calls at a time that would give a brief message. He said when people call in they want to make sure that someone knows that they do not have electricity.

City Manager West said we have the capacity now to receive 24 calls at one time. He said for every 24 we add.....Mayor Thomas said he was not talking about people. Mr. West said he was saying to do that without somebody getting a busy signal, for those 100 calls, we would need a phone line. He said there would have to be a T-1 line for every 24 calls that was taken at one time. Mr. West said our phone bill would go up an extra \$3,000.00 a month.

Mayor Thomas said now when people call in they get a recording. Mrs. Green said that is on the 615-3000 line. Mrs. Green said we need to direct them to call the 615-3302 number. That is your outage number. Commissioner Matthews asked if the outage number was printed on their utility bill? Mrs. Green said yes and also about a year ago every resident was sent a magnet that has all of our telephone numbers for reporting electrical outages, water problems, street limbs down, etc. She said we can do a better job of that, but everyone needs to make sure they have a battery powered radio at home and tune in to a local radio station. We would also encourage them to check on their neighbors, family and friends that may be on oxygen, etc. Mrs. Green said that is the message we send out and know that our staff is working to restore power immediately.

City Manager West said he was going to talk with Tim about an information line. He said we are going to be limited by how many calls it can take at one time. We also need to make sure that we get the message out that we will have information on our website as soon as we have problems like that so that the residents can get in the habit of going to the website.

Commissioner Newsome asked how often we made checks of voltage at residents in different areas. Mr. Mayes said we do that as requested. He said with the regulators and equipment we have it sustains the voltage on our main lines. Commissioner Newsome asked if we had meters we could hang across the line and determine whether or not that resident is receiving 110, 108 or fewer than 100 volts into the home. Mr. Mayes said we can log that. Commissioner Newsome

asked if we did that randomly. Mr. Mayes said no. Commissioner Newsome said that may be something that we may want to look at, particularly in areas where we have had outages. He said some of the homes that may be up and running may not be getting but 105 or 108 or even some less than 100 volts, but they are still operating. Commissioner Newsome said in many cases that could be only from a particular transformer that is feeding that particular home. Mr. Mayes said he would have to look into that and see what the specific problem is. Commissioner Newsome said if they feel the voltage in their home is less than 115, 230, 240, etc. they can request a voltage evaluation. Mr. Mayes said there is a difference between when you are instantaneous, but if the voltage has a problem or your current voltage has a problem we can go out and check that. If there is a problem that occurs but it is not occurring when we go out and check it we can do a log analysis of the service. Mr. Mayes said that is something that you only want to do if there is a problem that is intermittent; it is not a continuous problem. He said you can go out and check your voltage anytime to see if you are getting the correct voltage. Commissioner Newsome said his reason for this is that we may check a particular area today at 3:30 and note that 7 or 8 homes within that area, voltage is at 100 volts; that should tell us that we have a problem in that area and the likelihood of there is continuous draw in that particular area we may have a failure. Mr. Mayes said he has not seen any problems like that. The problems he has seen is where there is a problem with your neutral such as when squirrels chew through and they are having flickering or other voltage problems. Mr. Mayes said there have been problems where they have a dim light and we checked it and we found where the transformer was bad.

City Manager West said if anyone has a problem like that they should call us and let us check it out. Commissioner Newsome said if they have a problem and they feel like their toaster or their microwave, etc. is not getting the full voltage required they can call the City to come check it. Mr. Mayes said you can tell them if their main voltage is having a problem they can call us. Mr. West said the problem could be on their side of the line and they would have to call an electrician. Commissioner Newsome said that is when the problem is 50% of getting it solved and that would be good.

City Manager West stated that Ms. Janice Newsome has filed an appeal against the property at 1103 Sonata Street, which is on the agenda today.

Mayor Thomas introduced the application of Ashley James for a Restaurant Retail Liquor License for Quality Inn, located at 3053 Ross Clark Circle, SW. Commissioner Tidwell moved for approval, motion seconded by Commissioner Matthews and unanimously carried.

Mayor Thomas introduced Ordinance No. 2007-299 (recorded in Ordinance Book No. \_\_\_\_\_ at Page \_\_\_\_\_), declaring certain real property no longer needed for public or municipal purposes and conveying said parcel to the Industrial Development Board of the City of Dothan. Commissioner Tidwell moved for immediate consideration, motion seconded by Commissioner Matthews and upon the motion being put to vote, those voting "yea," were Thomas, Matthews, Newsome, Lee, Rudd and Tidwell; "nay:" none. The motion was carried by the majority of six "yeas" to no "nays."

Commissioner Tidwell then moved for adoption of Ordinance No. 2007-299, motion seconded by Commissioner Matthews and upon the motion being put to vote, those voting "yea," were Thomas, Matthews, Newsome, Lee, Rudd, and Tidwell; "nay:" none. The motion was carried by the majority of six "yeas" to no "nays."

Commissioner Rudd asked if this is the almost 78 acre tract? Mr. West said yes, it is in the Industrial Park on the corner of Westgate and Technology Drive.

Mayor Thomas announced that a Qualico affiliated company will be expanding their steel fabrication in the Westgate Industrial Park. Over the next 36 months there will be an additional 150 new jobs created in the community and at the end of 60 months there will be approximately 250 jobs.

On behalf of the City of Dothan, Mayor Thomas welcomed the investment to the community and offered support to Qualico as it builds its presence in our community. Mayor Thomas expressed appreciation to the County, State, Chamber of Commerce, City staff and the Industrial Development Board for their assistance and work on this project. Also, to the leaders of Qualico for their investment in growth in the Dothan/Houston County area.

Mayor Thomas introduced Resolution No. 2007-300 (recorded in Ordinance Book No. \_\_\_\_\_ at Page \_\_\_\_\_), declaring eight properties as creating a nuisance and constituting a hazard to the public health, safety and convenience and authorizing the demolition and removal of same. Commissioner Newsome moved for adoption, motion seconded by Commissioner Matthews. Todd McDonald presented a PowerPoint presentation of the properties listed in the proposed ordinance. The structure on 612 E. Lafayette Street has been demolished by the owner and therefore is no longer an issue. Mr. McDonald said this time we approached things differently. We had members of the Fire Department, Health Department and Police Department join our inspectors in the field to help identify the nuisance value of these structures. Mr. McDonald said we have letters in the files now from those departments with regards to the nuisance characteristics to these structures all of which support the Housing Code Abatement Board's recommendation to the Commission.

Mr. McDonald stated that there were issues with the address for the structure at 607 Vassar Street. Some of the properties on Vassar also have Citadel Avenue addresses on it. Mr. McDonald said the parcel was advertised correctly in the legal add and he would recommend that it remain on this list. The structure on 408 Linden Street has also been demolished. He stated that the structure on 1412 East Newton Street was presented to the Housing Code Abatement Board, however, it is a commercial structure and there is a separate process for that and it would need to come off this list.

Commissioner Tidwell asked what the process was for the commercial property at 1412 East Newton Street. Mr. McDonald said that is would go to Circuit Court. City Attorney Len White said it would take at least three months, but could take longer.

Commissioner Newsome asked if we were going to have the same problem on the commercial building that is on Patterson Street. He said if we have to go through Circuit Court on this one we may need to proceed with the one on Patterson Street. Commissioner Newsome said the Abatement Board may have some concerns on that. He said he would like to see them move on that.

At this time, Mayor Thomas stated that the Commission would hear the appeal of Ms. Janice Newsome for 1103 Sonata Street. Ms. Newsome said she had been working on the property. She has other property she has to work on so her time is limited. Ms. Newsome said she has made a plan and would present it to the Commission and to Mr. McDonald. She stated that she needed more time to work on the property. Commissioner Tidwell asked Ms. Newsome how long she had owned the property. Ms. Newsome said has owned it for about a year. Commissioner Tidwell asked Ms. Newsome if she had done any work on the inside. Ms. Newsome said it is going to need work. She said she has temporary service there now so she could work on it. Mayor Thomas asked Ms. Newsome to make sure the City staff had a copy of her plan. He said what we typically do is to move forward with this and as long as she was making substantial progress nothing would become of the property.

Commissioner Lee asked if there was a time frame with the plan. Ms. Newsome said within a year.

Commissioner Newsome asked if the property would be up to code within a year. Ms. Newsome said yes. He then asked if there were any immediate projections on what would be done within a month, two months, etc. Ms. Newsome said yes; it is in the plan.

Commissioner Rudd asked Ms. Newsome what kind of work had been done to the home? He said according to the pictures it did not look like anything had been done to it. Ms. Newsome said she had worked on the porch, getting the fixtures

leveled. She said she worked a full time job and works on this structure when she can. Ms. Newsome said she keeps the grass cut and everything trimmed over there. She said she has other property that she tends to and that her father is ill so she has to spend time with him. Ms. Newsome said what extra time she has she spends it on the most important property at the time, which happens to be 1103 Sonata Street.

Commissioner Newsome said when we acquire dilapidated properties we recognize on acquisition that work must be done, not later, but now. He said sometimes that might help us decide whether or not we can bring a dilapidated piece of property up to standard. Commissioner Newsome said all of the buildings on the list with the exception of 211 Morgan Street are in District 2. He said he has been looking at those buildings for the last four years and knows what exactly has been done to most of them. Commissioner Newsome said we want to help the districts in the City of Dothan improve the quality of life for those who are here and when we have properties like that as our next door neighbors it does not help a lot. He said we are going to have to bring our property up to code and we are going to have to do it expeditiously. Commissioner Newsome said we will take a look at the plan and if it is lived up to within the time limit that has been stated then we will understand, but otherwise we have no alternative but to demolish it. Ms. Newsome said she understood.

Commissioner Tidwell asked how often are these completions checked? Mr. McDonald said we stay after it. They are required to pull a permit and they have monthly inspections.

Commissioner Lee asked Mr. McDonald if he had been in contact with Ms. Newsome in the last several months to try and get some work done to this piece of property? Mr. McDonald said no, we have too many cases to do that. We go through the process of notification, advertise and post. He said the individuals need to be responsible for their own properties. Mr. West said she was aware that the house went before the Housing Code Abatement Board. Commissioner Lee asked how long ago was she notified about that? Mr. McDonald said the Housing Code Abatement Board heard that in May. She would have received notification of the meeting and then there was another legal process to advertise that in the sixty day period between when the Housing Code Abatement Board and this hearing today. Mayor Thomas said if she fixes her property everything is good and that is what we are after.

Commissioner Lee said he agreed with Commissioner Newsome when he said sometimes we can get more on our plate than we can handle and in this particular case what happens is that the neighbors and everyone else has to pay the consequences.

There being no further discussion, Commissioners Newsome and Matthews removed their motion and second for approval. Commissioner Lee moved to amend the resolution to remove 1412 East Newton Street from the list, motion seconded by Commissioner Tidwell and unanimously carried. Commissioner Tidwell then moved to approve the resolution as amended, motion seconded by Commissioner Matthews and unanimously carried.

Mayor Thomas introduced Resolution No. 2007-301 (recorded in Ordinance Book No. \_\_\_\_\_ at Page \_\_\_\_\_), entering into an agreement with Public Service Sign Company for the placing of "Please Don't Litter-Keep Dothan Beautiful" signs on the public right-of-way. Commissioner Matthews moved for adoption, motion seconded by Commissioner Lee and unanimously adopted.

Mr. West said they are selling advertisement. We get \$5.00 per sign.

Mayor Thomas introduced Resolution No. 2007-302 (recorded in Ordinance Book No. \_\_\_\_\_ at Page \_\_\_\_\_), awarding the bid and entering into an agreement with Northstar Engineering Services for professional surveying services for the S. Beverlye Road/E. Saunders Road/Forrester Road/E. Cottonwood Road intersection improvements in the amount of \$19,500.00. Commissioner Tidwell moved for adoption, motion seconded by Commissioner Newsome.

Commissioner Lee said once this is done does it move to the County for the next step. Mr. West said yes, this is what the County needs to determine the right-of-way. Commissioner Lee said at this point we have done all we can do to date and now it is in the County’s hands to do their part and then we are going to work together to complete the project. Mr. West said we are going to do the plans for that road so the County will know what right-of-way they need. Jerry Corbin, Public Works Director stated that this is the first step. He said they will do the acquisition of the right-of-ways themselves based on these legal descriptions. Mr. Corbin said that will set the stage for the design which we will do in-house and give them the design documents for them to bid.

Mayor Thomas asked if the next step after this is to design that so they will know what to acquire or will they be acquiring right-of-way. Mr. Corbin said they will be acquiring right-of-way after the preliminary design is done which will be the next step after this survey.

Commissioner Lee asked how long that would take? Mr. Corbin said it should not take more than 60 days to get them something they could use. Some of that may be tweaking some of our actual right-of-way maps. Mr. Corbin said he would not assume we could survey this and nail the precise route with just the survey operation. He said we will be working with the surveyor and their engineer to nail it when we do the survey to start with. Commissioner Lee said he was trying to get a time frame. He said from the time we get this, our preliminary drawings to pass to the County. Mr. Corbin said **90 days** should be a reasonable time frame. City Manager West said that assumes if nothing goes wrong. He said typically, one of the most difficult parts of doing any improvement is the acquisition of right-of-way. Commissioner Lee said he heard **90 days**. Mr. Corbin said it is not reasonable to assume that everyone that is involved here, property owner wise, is going to sell the County their property. Commissioner Lee agreed. He said we have to go into it with a positive attitude that we are going to get it done in 90 days. Mayor Thomas said the 90 days is us having a document ready to hand to the County to acquire right-of-way and we can handle that. Mr. West said that is right, but when it takes a year to get all of the right-a-way that is not unusual. Commissioner Lee said that is after the **90 days**. There being no further discussion the resolution was unanimously adopted.

Mayor Thomas introduced Resolution No. 2007-303 (recorded in Ordinance Book No. \_\_\_\_\_ at Page \_\_\_\_\_), entering into an agreement with Océ Imagistics for the rental of a copier for the Public Works Department, Street and Environmental Services Divisions for a three-year period at a monthly cost of \$109.00 plus \$.0076 per copy. Commissioner Tidwell moved for adoption, motion seconded by Commissioner Matthews and unanimously adopted.

Mayor Thomas introduced Resolution No. 2007-304 (recorded in Ordinance Book No. \_\_\_\_\_ at Page \_\_\_\_\_), reappointing Edward Vaughn as a member of the Historical Preservation Commission. Commissioner Newsome moved for adoption, motion seconded by Commissioner Matthews and unanimously adopted.

Mayor Thomas introduced Resolution No. 2007-305 (recorded in Ordinance Book No. \_\_\_\_\_ at Page \_\_\_\_\_), awarding the following bids and approving other purchases over \$7,500.00 by the City. Commissioner Rudd read each item in the meeting.
